

A quarterly update to the community at large.

September 2020

The third quarter, July to September, has seen further Covid-19 business disruption. Lockdown levels were lifted and then renewed and volunteers and staff have been able to complete a number of projects by adapting rapidly to new rules.

A Sanctuary site plan has been drafted that incorporates perspectives from ecosystem restoration, visitor experience and operations. This is a living document which will be influenced by future species' translocations.

The 2020-35 vision document outlining aims for the next 15 years of the Sanctuary is nearing completion and will be released later this year. This document, read together with the annual report, should give the reader a clear understanding of the Sanctuary: its purpose, current activity and performance, and its direction.

As part of improving our offering for receiving and managing legacies such as bequests and endowments we have established an independent Sanctuary Foundation Trust. A profile of the new foundation trust is included later in this edition.

The Brook Waimārama Trust has now developed into a fully operational sanctuary following the completion of projects including The Loop Track, the top dam bridge construction, and the installation of signage, while operational resources continued to be utilised on maintenance, pest control and biosecurity measures. The Trust also moved from a gratuity model for entry to the Sanctuary to a full pricing model. This appears to have been well accepted by the majority of visitors, as numbers have held up well and both gate takings and membership numbers have increased to 30 August 2020.

Our financial results have been completed and audited and end of year results to 30 June 2020 are as follows: total income for the Trust increased from \$658,821 to \$843,478, an increase of \$184,657. This figure included a bequest of \$100,000, Covid wage subsidy of \$41,006 and grants pertaining to the top dam bridge of \$138,131. Total operating expenses reduced from \$656,066 to \$570,975, the main reduction being the completion of the slip reinstatement in the previous year. The net result was a cash surplus of \$272,503, and after depreciation, a surplus of \$120,420.

#### Sanctuary-wide survey

This was recently successfully completed and this time, no rats or mustelids were detected. There were 2,111 tunnels loaded with pest detection cards and 229 DOC200 traps set and baited. A total of 51 volunteers were active in the field with another 13 organising and coordinating, driving and reading cards – a great effort.

#### Latest technology deployed in Sanctuary

The Sanctuary needs to be predator-free before species' reintroductions and new technology has been deployed to help us achieve this goal. Working with Zero Invasive Predators (ZIP), we are now trialling cameras and ZIP's Moto-Lure. Cameras have been shown to be a much more sensitive tool than tracking tunnels for mustelids (very few prints have been detected in our tracking tunnels and it is thought weasels won't often enter tunnels that they can see right through). The Moto-Lure (right) is an automatic lure dispenser where a small electric motor releases a programmed amount of lure at a specific time each day, effectively luring the weasels into the camera's path for detection without needing volunteers to continually rebait tracking cards



#### **Operations Activities**

As the fence bench settles and consolidates we get some movement of the ground, particularly on the eastern side of the Sanctuary.



Fixing these issues involves a few of the volunteer teams working together: the assets and fence repair teams realigned a short section of fence which was situated on soft ground; the asset team then built a retaining wall to stabilise the ground before the fence repair team moved the fence into a better line; finally the fence checking team came along to ensure that the resulting new section of fence was bio secure.

The track maintenance team have been fixing slumps and cracks along the base of the fence to ensure the fence is bio secure and the track inside the fence is in good condition for the monitoring team.

# Rare Fischer's Egg fungus found in the Sanctuary

Volunteer Chris Tarton made this exciting find and Wayne Hennessy went about getting a positive identification. It has been confirmed as *claustula fischeri* which was first identified and named by Lady Rigg, New Zealand's first female Doctor of Science, in 1926. It is one of only two fungi red-listed internationally as endangered and has been found only in the Fringe Hill/Dun Mountain area, Gore, Dunedin and Tasmania.

# Banded Toutouwai

Another good find, this time by Wayne, was a banded toutouwai (robin) whose band was placed some nine years ago. As toutouwai normally only live an average of three years in the wild, this places him in the 'venerable' category which goes with his suggested nickname Koro or grandfather. Wayne was busy training two young birds when they encountered each other.

The huge table and chairs created by volunteer Brian Pollock is just inside the entrance gate - still work in progress - has already been used by a school group.



**Stone Carving.** Recent human history is featured with the founding of the Brook Waimarama Sanctuary Trust, represented by a large version of the Trust's logo—a stylised representation of a bird and a human hand, also created by Dean Raybould. Our logo carving is progressing and a site has been identified close to the Brook Stream for its future placement.

# **Fencepost sponsorship**. This is an ongoing opportunity for supporters who want a small 'mark' of their own in the Sanctuary; we really appreciate the people who bought posts in recent months.

**Kay Chapman's fundraising effort update.** After several months and just 399 kms short of completing the 3000km Te Araroa Track, volunteer Kay Chapman's aim to walk the length of New Zealand was scuppered with the announcement of the Covid-19 lockdown in March. Kay set up a Give A Little page for the Sanctuary supporting the walk and raised nearly \$3500 for the Sanctuary, which was most appreciated. Kay plans to complete the final part later in the year.

# **Binoculars.** A long standing volunteer donated the funds to purchase 22 sets of binoculars for educational use within the Sanctuary.

**De Walt inkind support.** The Auckland based office didn't hesitate to help the Sanctuary and have generously supplied an assortment of over 40 hand tools and pieces of equipment that will be put to good use in the Sanctuary.

# Becoming part of a national trail of Great Sanctuaries of Aotearoa

The 'Great Sanctuaries of Aotearoa' Trail is under development, as follow:

- North Island sanctuaries came together in June/July to discuss lifting visitor numbers to pre-Covid levels. These sanctuaries all offer a visitor experience and were generating revenue through gate sales
- South Island sanctuaries were then invited to get involved
- A collaboration of seven fenced Sanctuaries has formed including the Brook Waimārama Sanctuary
- We will promote each other at our respective visitor centres/gate sales facilities with printed material and online, with a plan for combined offers at a later date
- The national trail will evolve over time involving more sanctuaries as they develop their visitor experiences.

# The Brook Waimārama Trust Foundation

While the Brook Waimārama Sanctuary Trust is itself a charitable trust, the Trust has decided to establish a separate charitable trust for the purposes of receiving bequests, gifts and endowments from third parties.



The sole mission of the Foundation is for the benefit of the Sanctuary, but the independence and longterm nature of the Foundation are steadying factors, particularly in difficult times. #### Foundation Trust Investment Programme
