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KEEPING YOU INFORMED

TĒNĀ KOUTOU KATOĀ FROM OUR CHAIR

Over the past eight months the Board of Trustees and senior management have conducted internal workshops facilitated by an independent facilitator who was familiar with the Sanctuary, its culture and objectives.

The purpose was to review the committees that make up the working structure and report to the board. Questions such as, is the committee still pertinent, is it fit for purpose, does it meet and/or achieve its objectives, is its terms of reference still relevant, is the structure, numbers or make up in order, were amongst the questions asked during the review. Other matters considered included reporting lines, relationship, time and commitments to other committees.

The review has given rise to a number of changes within the various committees from minor to significant, readjustment of the focus or just a tweak in some instances.

As the Trustees reviewed each committee it became clear how each one although independent, dovetailed and was dependent on the others to both achieve objectives, and support or contribute to the well-being of other committees. The net result is a structure that is both robust and flexible enough to meet future requirements and expectations of the Sanctuary in the ensuing years.

Our success is readily recognised today when we review various key components such as "security" (e.g. of the fence, tracks, railings, signs, bridges, environment, tools and mechanical equipment), eco-system (biosecurity, fence integrity and species introductions), improving financial position, increasing supporter base, increasing visitor numbers, Open Days etc. From marketing, finance, engineering, fund raising, legal, environmental, health and safety, all are playing a part in the continued growth and development of the Sanctuary.

Although not always obvious, trustees are actively involved, usually chairing or being part of committees which enables them to hear from those working and volunteering 'at the coal face' of the Sanctuary's activities.

The Board is also aware of the need to ensure the ongoing sustainability of the Sanctuary as it evolves and demographics change (as they always will). The changes arising from the above workshops will ensure the Trust Board and its committee structure are fit for purpose for the coming years.

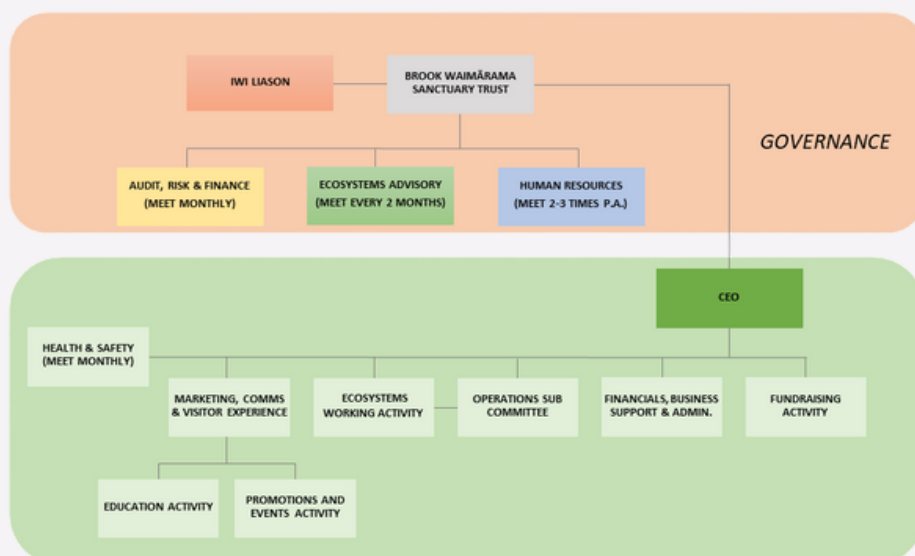

NEW COMMITTEE STRUCTURE

As mentioned on page one, the Sanctuary Trustees have recently reviewed the committee structure. With the increased number of staff in the organisation, the operational staff can absorb more day-to-day Sanctuary management activity.

The Audit, Risk & Finance, and the Eco-Systems advisory committees are retained, and together with (the new) Human Resources advisory committee, report directly to the Trustees. The Health & Safety committee, chaired by Paul Russell will now report to the Board via the Chief Executive. Nick Robson, our Operations Manager will chair the Operations Committee.

Marketing, Comms. and Visitor Experience; Ecosystems (working); Operations; Financials, Business Support & Admin., and Fundraising will all report via the Chief Executive.



Although the new structure represents a reduction in the number of committees reporting directly to the Board, Trustees will remain involved through the Sanctuary operations.

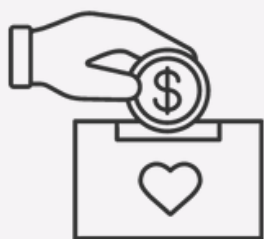

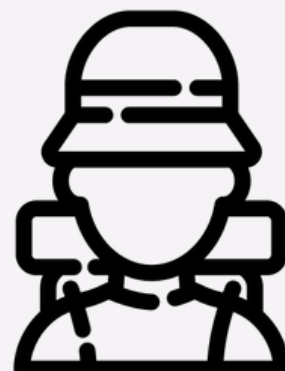

PROJECTS UNDERWAY

As always, our volunteer teams (and paid contractors) have been busy in recent months, here's a brief update on just some of the projects currently underway.

- The handrails installation project on the Loop Track ground to a halt over the COVID lockdown period, but work has restarted and is now about 60% complete.
- Kaka aviary development and installation - this asset will be important for future species introductions and will be located close to key walking tracks so the public can further connect with nature. The necessary resource consents have been gained, now we wait for building materials to arrive.
- Flagstone Bridge installation - repairs and maintenance on the bridge donated by Nelson City Council are underway. The bridge will help improve the walking track experience for visitors.
- Visitor Centre building enhancement - the project is to help improve the building as the ticketing and administration centre for the Sanctuary. Building should commence shortly after the end of the busy summer period.

SIGNIFICANT NEW FUNDING

The Sanctuary is delighted to have secured significant funding from the Jobs for Nature programme through the Department of Conservation for Invasive & Noxious Weed Control.

The funding will enable the Sanctuary:

- to employ 9.3 full time equivalent employees over three years
- formal training in the areas of 4x4 training, pesticide use and handling, chainsaw use
- informal training in weed identification, weed control methods and VHF radio use
- purchase of pesticides
- assorted tools
- the purchase of a 4WD quad bike and trailer
- the lease of an additional ute and insurance.

A Sanctuary-wide weed control plan has been developed as part of the application process for this grant.

Under the funding agreement we will be tackling a variety of weed species including conifers/wilding pines, gorse, broom, Old Man's Beard, tradescantia and woolly nightshade.

We're delighted to announce that Murray Neill (pictured below) has been appointed as the Weed Control Coordinator under this funding arrangement.

Interviews to recruit the rest of the weeding team are now completed, we hope to have the full team in place by early October.

Shown below, Tony Bowater, CEO Bowater Toyota with the Toyota Landcruiser which is on loan to the Sanctuary until our new (leased) vehicle arrives in about four months time. The leased vehicle is funded by the Department of Conservation via the Jobs for Nature Weed Control project.



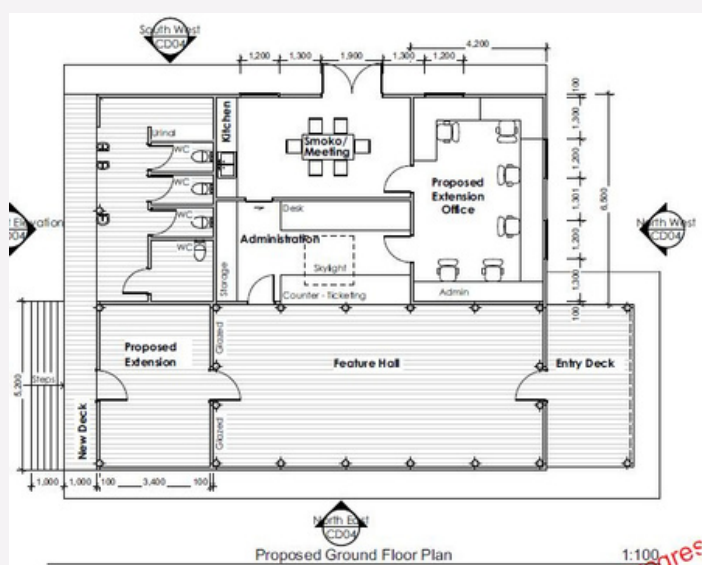
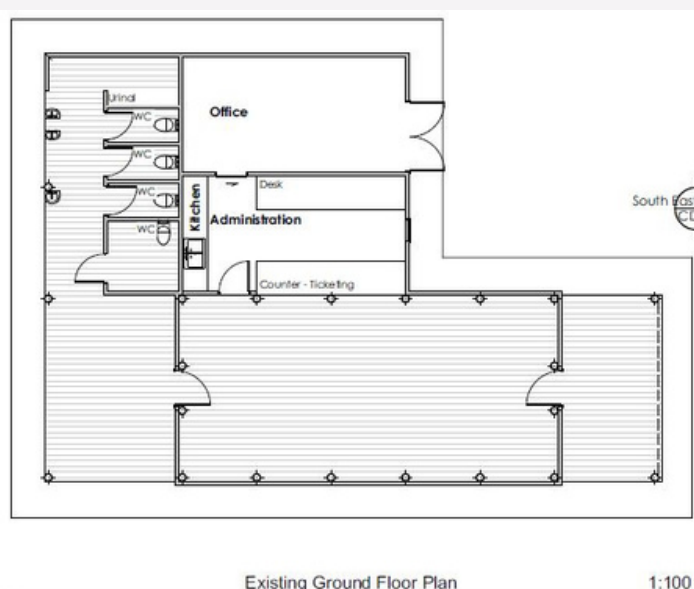
VISITOR CENTRE ENHANCEMENT PLANS

Earlier this year we received a grant from Simplicity Charitable Trust for enhancements to the Visitor Centre. The plan is to improve the back office layout and to weather-proof and insulate the building.

Plans drafted by redbox architects have been circulated with staff and volunteers and have been through several iterations incorporating feedback and suggestions.

The work is now planned to commence March or April 2022 following the summer visitor season.

Work includes enclosing the back deck for additional display space, creating a 'smoko/meeting' room where the existing back office is, and creating new office space on the front of the building.



COVID IMPACT ON SANCTUARY

During the August COVID19 lockdown we were, once again, fortunate to have one of our staff living at the Brook Motor camp and on site at the Sanctuary to do essential work around the Sanctuary. Maintaining our predator-free biosecurity was classified as essential work.

The main job was to carry out regular checks of the fence and to ensure the fence breach monitoring system was working. We didn't have any breaches during level four, although we did send other ops staff in under level four restrictions to clear culverts after a storm event and to assist with ongoing breach response monitoring.

The lockdown did cause some delay to Sanctuary maintenance and projects. The urgent ones were restarted at level three and now that we have reached level two all teams are back in action with COVID19 Level Two protocols in place.

CLEAN UP AFTER HEAVY RAIN IN AUGUST

The wet weather in August caused a number of problems inside the Sanctuary. On the 27th August Third House recorded 155mm of rain in 24 hours which is a 2-5 year rain event.

The track team had two slips to deal with and there were two wash outs on the Loop Track. We also found a lot of fallen trees, both on the valley floor and up the top of the Sanctuary, some of these have been very large beech trees.

The visitor tracks are all back in order now. At the end of August we still had some large trees to be removed from the monitoring tracks and the track team are progressing this in order of priority.

KAKA APPLICATION TO DOC

Planning is underway to reintroduce kākā back to the Sanctuary – for that an application to translocate kākā to the sanctuary has been lodged with the Department of Conservation. The intention is to source the offspring from captive kākā pairs that have Top of the South (TOS) heritage, this will also contribute to TOS kākā conservation in general.

The Sanctuary has received grant funds from the Stout Trust and a number of private individuals to build a kaka translocation aviary in which to hold the birds after their translocation before release into the Sanctuary. Resource consent to build the kaka aviary has been approved by Nelson City Council.

Materials (mesh) for the aviary is on order and we await delivery so that building can commence.

TĪEKE POPULATION SURVEY

Over the past two weeks our Ecologist Robert and a large team of volunteers have been conducting a tīeke population survey to estimate the number of tīeke present in the Sanctuary. 40 birds were translocated to the Sanctuary last April.

The tīeke survey involved a team of 58 volunteers playing tīeke playback calls along 29 transects covering 90km of monitoring lines over a two week period. The volunteers played a tīeke playback call every 100m waiting for 2-3 mins. for a response and then moved on and repeated the procedure. Doing this the team covered the entire Sanctuary.

Another tīeke population survey will be conducted, by April 2022 at the latest, possibly sooner.

OTHER TRANSLOCATIONS

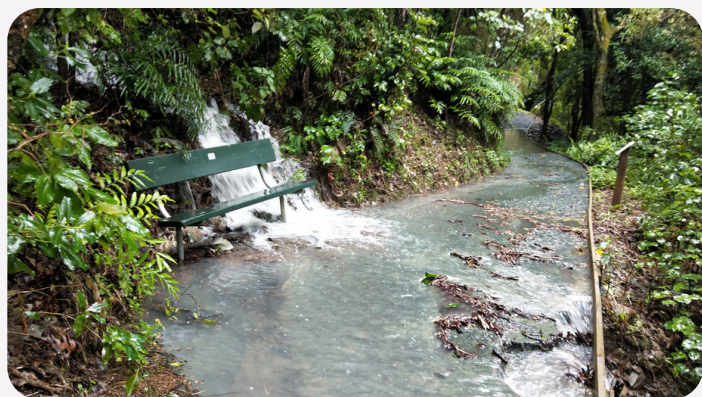
We are in the early stages of planning for additional species translocations and we'll provide updates on these in future editions of eNews, on our website and via our social media channels.

We're hopeful that there will be more to tell in the not too distant future!

ASSET TEAM INSTALLS NEW DRAIN ON LOOP TRACK

The recent heavy rain washed away part of the Loop Track on the western side of the valley.

The existing drain was too small to cope with the rain washing down the side stream which overflowed over the track, undermining part of it. The assets team laid larger pipes down the side gully and under the track into the Brook Stream.



FENCE CHECKING

The fence suffers all sorts of damage as we well know from reports and pictures of tree and rock falls.

However, not all damage is so obvious, so a dedicated team of regulars led by Michael Humphries go hunting on a weekly basis for minor damage to the fence.

In the early days of the fence's construction many gaps and faults were found, many originating at the factory which have all, by and large, since been fixed.

Team members carry a repair kit with them consisting of fence mesh patches, pliers, wire, duct tape, spanner and a probe to test holes are less than 6mm. These kits enable on-the-spot repairs to be made.

This dedicated team checks the entire 14.4km of fence every two to three weeks and then start the process all over again. After three years of regular checking, there are fewer and fewer problems being found. Such vigilance is essential for maintaining the integrity of the fence and protecting the Sanctuary from pest incursions.

Here's an example of a recent find:



This hole was found together with about a dozen others and the guess is that goats were grazing on the outside and objected to the fence getting in the way of a good feed!

The hole is big enough to allow a small mammal in if it were able to find it.

POWER TOOLS DONATED

Another generous donation of power tools from Stanley Black and Decker NZ of battery operated power tools valued at over \$5,000 was received in August. The DeWalt range features the flexvolt 54V 5pce kit that will give the power of corded tools, so perfect for those remote areas that we require commercial tools. We are very appreciative of this very useful support.

DONATION POINT TAP DEVICE

The Sanctuary recently purchased two electronic donation 'point tap' devices. The cost of purchasing one of these devices was kindly covered by our Sanctuary sponsor NBS.



One of these devices is currently at River Kitchen Cafe and the other at NBS. Using an EFTPOS card or credit card, visitors can make an automatic \$5 donation to the Sanctuary. CREATIVE ARTS GRANT

Our thanks to the Nelson City Creative Communities Scheme for a grant of \$913.10 for arts materials which will be used at a youth workshop as part of Open Day next month.

The initial funds have now been transferred to The Brook Waimarama Sanctuary Foundation Trust to kick-start the Foundation investment activities to generate future income for the benefit of the Sanctuary.

RECENTLY HEARD IN THE SANCTUARY

Spring has sprung! We have heard the call of the migratory Pīpīwharau (shining cuckoo) in the Sanctuary.

Māori welcomed Pīpīwharau with the proverb "Ka tangi te wharau, ko ngā karere a mahuru" – "If the shining cuckoo cries, it is the messenger of spring".

When you hear the distinctive call that comprises of several high notes followed by a single falling note "Kui! Kui! Kui!" it is time to plant your spring veggies!

The Pīpīwharau are famous for being brood parasites, laying their eggs in the nests of Grey Warblers, leaving the ever so kind warbler to raise its chick.

GUIDED WALKS/TOURS

DAY TOUR

We are really excited to now be offering regular guided tours through the Sanctuary for anyone wanting to maximise their knowledge and/or time while visiting.

A gentle walk of 60-90 minutes, each tour will stop at several points of interest with an experienced volunteer guide explaining:

- The history of the valleys
- Stories of the bush including history and Māori use of plants
- The plants and animals all around us
- The conservation work we are doing and why it's important for all of us.

The tours depart at 10.30am from the Visitor Centre, every Sunday, and other selected days during the summer ([check our website](#) for details). We can tailor guided tours for groups around specific topics relating to the Sanctuary.

NIGHT TOUR RESULTS

Total Glowworm tour numbers, including all free tours during 11 June -1 September (booked groups) total 34 tours involving 384 people doing the glowworm tours including the volunteers. COVID lockdown levels disrupted tours through early September, with some being postponed a few weeks and others cancelled. The volunteer guides, operations staff and Kirsten, the Visitor Centre Coordinator are to be congratulated on achieving a great result and for lifting the Sanctuary profile amongst the Nelson/Tasman community.

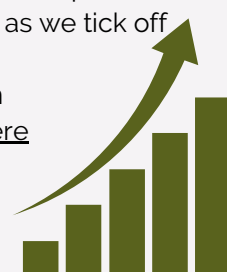
